

Message from our Pastor 2023 Annual Report



The eyes of all wait for you, and you give them their food in its time, opening your hand and satisfying the longing of every living thing.
(Psalm 145:15-16)

Dear People of God,

When I think about all the facility projects that we have completed in the four years since I started here, I am amazed both at God's faithfulness and at the financial generosity of this congregation.

Since I started here in February of 2020, we have:

- Replaced three different heating systems (2020, 2021, 2024)
- Replaced half of the sanctuary roof (2021)
- Painted and sided two buildings (2022, 2023)
- Replaced the doors and windows on the parish house (2023)
- Installed a brand new up-to-code septic system serving both buildings (2023)

And while that list may make it seem like all our resources were directed towards our property, that couldn't be further from the truth!

During that same period of time, we have:

- Purchased a grand piano (2021)
- Installed live-streaming capabilities in the sanctuary (2021)
- Hosted an Intern Pastor (2022-2023)
- Established a partnership with the Dancraig school in Tanzania (2022-present)
- More than doubled our budgeted charitable giving (\$20k in 2020, \$49k in 2023)
- Given <u>additional</u> time, talents, and treasure to our community partners
 (Lutherwood, Family Promise, Friendship House, Helping Hands Food Bank, etc.)

All this was done without us having to borrow any money or shirk on any obligations, and all while we continued to carry out our first calling of delivering the love of God in Jesus Christ to people of many different ages and circumstances. God has truly blessed us!

As I reflect on the remarkable outpouring of activity over the past few years, I am also reminded of the need for times of rest in which we can catch our breath. We have been faithfully exhaling God's abundance for the last few years, and my prayer for this year is that it is an opportunity for us to also inhale, to breathe deeply of the goodness of our God. God is faithful to give us what we need in its time, whether that is a time of exuberant activity or a time of restful receiving.

A few highlights from 2023:

A renewed focus on youth: One of Pastor Lori's greatest gifts to us was in establishing our Tuesday evening youth and young adult group. This group, now led by Jenny Sheahan, continues to meet every week for food and fellowship, and strives to be a welcoming and safe "third place" for young people to gather. I plan to join them once a month for play, discussion, and Bible study. In addition, the renewed Children, Youth, and Family committee is working to plan events for all ages throughout the year.

Community Bible Experience: Much of my time and energy these past few months has gone into our 40-week journey through scripture using *The Books of the Bible* from Zondervan publishing. We continue to have 15-25 people attend the 9am Sunday morning class where we discuss the week's athome readings, and our Sunday morning readings continue to help us appreciate the grand story of the Bible.

New Confirmation Format: This past Fall, I started a confirmation curriculum with four seventh graders and their parents based on *Free to Be* by Gerhard Forde and Jim Nestingen. I am thoroughly enjoying our time together and the insights that come from both parents and children together.

Goals and Areas of Focus: At our congregational meeting in June, we approved six areas of focus to guide our efforts through 2025, and in December the council set some specific goals for 2024 informed by those areas of focus.

New Lutherwood Executive Director: I was honored to be part of the interview team for the hiring of Lutherwood's new Executive Director who started this month. He'll hit the ground running with lots to do as they prepare for camp this Summer. Please pray for their success!

Dear Beloveds in Christ,

This last year has been both wonderful and difficult. It has been filled with joys and sorrows, laughter and tears, connections and disruptions. It has been a time of starting new ministries and, sadly, working with five congregations as they closed. This last year has been both life-affirming and exhausting.

As I reflect on this last year and look to 2024, I hold close one of my favorite scriptures: For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. Romans 8:38-39

Sometimes when we are anxious or concerned, we forget to trust that God is present and active. That God is here with us – through all things – and that nothing will separate us from this. We might forget this when we are busy figuring out budgets and salaries, church maintenance and worship attendance. We might have arguments and exhaustion might creep in.

But these verses help us remember that the focus is always on Jesus and God's love for us through Jesus. After all, the church was not created in order to "be church." We don't exist just for ourselves or to keep a business running. Instead, the church exists in this world because we have encountered Jesus. And knowing Jesus, trusting Jesus, loving Jesus, nothing is ever the same. As authors Root and Bertrand write in *When Church Stops Working*, "The church is the gathered people who are in the world, like Paul, and who have experienced the acts of God through an encounter with Jesus Christ." (p. 74)

Root and Bertrand further write:

Paul starts churches not for the sake of churches, not to stave off decline or accelerate growth, but for the sake of forming communities that serve the world by witnessing to God's acts in the world ... It is the community that rehearses and narrates the story of God's acts for the world, waiting together for God's coming again in the return of Jesus. (p. 75)

In other words, the church is a community formed because of an encounter with Jesus and who gather to practice and share what God is doing in this world through the Holy Spirit.

As you gather for your Annual Meetings, I encourage you to have conversation about what it means to be church today:

- 1. What is God doing in your community today?
- 2. What does an encounter with Jesus look like for you?
- 3. How are you practicing what God is calling you to do and to be?
- 4. What does Romans 8:38-39 mean in your life and your congregation's life?
- 5. How are we waiting together in the mystery of God's presence now and into the future?

I am grateful for all of you and I thank you for the honor of being your Bishop. May we trust that through all things God is with us through Jesus and God's love shines through all.

God's abundant blessings on your annual meeting and throughout 2024.

Message from the Church Council President 2023 Annual Report

Dear Edison Lutheran Church members,

Edison Lutheran Church has continued in the year 2023 to be a very healthy congregation. Our worship numbers are good each Sunday morning as are the number of people active in the many activities that go on during the week. We continue to be lead by Pastor John Guthridge on Sunday mornings as well as during the week. Pastor John continues to challenge us, lead us, guide and help us.

Sunday mornings the children have Sunday School classes lead by many great teachers; and this fall the adults also have a chance to learn with the new program Community Bible Experience Classes taught by Pastor John. He is also using the same experience in Sunday morning sermons. We are reading through the Old Testament and will continue through the Bible the remainder of the year. Members also have a chance to study the Bible with Pastor John's Monday evening Bible Study and the Women's Bible Study once a month.

Aiding Sunday morning worship is our choir which adds so much to worship and also the Altar Guild which keeps all parts of worship running smoothly. Many members of our congregation volunteer to serve coffee hour after worship each week, giving our members a chance to visit and catch up over a cup of coffee and a snack.

Edison has many committees that take care of our church, our congregation and our community. Taking care of our buildings is the Property & Management Committee who has been very busy this year. Just recently they worked to put in a new furnace in the Fellowship Hall and Sunday School unit. They work regularly to keep big and little things working properly.

Taking care of our congregation is the Parish Life Committee. This year they put on the Harvest Dinner and Pie Auction and a Christmas Brunch after the Sunday School program. Under the umbrella of Parish Life is the Care Team which visits our home bound members and those in nursing homes; and the Prayer Shawl Ministry which makes shawls to give as a physical sign of Edison's caring to those who need comfort.

The Social Concerns Committee helps take care of our community. They organize us in giving to Friendship House, Family Promise, Josephine Caring Community, running a blood drive and giving to local food banks. They also set up a giving tree at Christmas.

Another group who works on outreach is our Evangelism Committee. The bags for children that are ready each week, bags for new members are put together by this group and bags for visitors.

Our Christian Education and Youth Committee has been reorganizing this year and working to continue the work begun by our 2022-23 Intern Lori. They recently hosted a game day for all members of our church family. We look forward to hearing more from this group.

A few things that continue to make our congregation healthy is live-streaming our Sunday morning worship services, the continued giving financially by our membership and Carrie in the office to oversee the finances, the many members who give of their talents and time every month and the 12 people who serve as our Church Council. These members meet each month and make decisions to make sure Edison Lutheran stays the wonderful healthy congregation it is. It has been an honor and a privilege to serve as president of this dedicated group. We all look forward to serving in 2024.

Provide more social opportunities for our youth and families.

Provide four quarterly church family activities (all ages) during 2024

Increase knowledge and fluency in reading the Bible among congregation members.

- Continue our Community Bible Experience through June 2024
- Beginning Fall 2024: Incorporate fun and playful ways to interact with the bible on a monthly basis

Maintain, support, and grow youth group through regular meetings and social outings.

- Recruit 1-2 more regular adult leaders by February 2024
- Have at least six active members on the Youth committee by June 2024
- Have 3-4 youth outings planned by June 2024

Continue and expand support for local and global community organizations.

- Develop service partnership with one additional organization during 2024
- Intentionally recruit 10 new volunteers across our community partnerships

Continue to hold worship in high regard, supporting our Worship & Music Committee.

- Begin soliciting hymn suggestions from congregants by March 2024
- Investigate need for more quiet prior to Sunday service by February 2024

Involve many different people of all ages in all the roles of worship, including holding 1-2 youth Sunday services per year.

- Have two youth-led services during 2024
- Develop a list of members not currently involved in church volunteer activities by August 2024

Edison Lutheran Church Annual Congregational Meeting Sunday, January 29, 2023

Call to Order: Linda Johnson called the meeting to order at 12:05 p.m.

John read 1 Corinthians 12:12 and led the congregation in an opening prayer.

Roll was taken via sign-in sheet.

Scott Connor moved and Mike Miller seconded approval of the minutes from the last annual meeting. Approved unanimously.

Larry Olsen moved and Jean Miller seconded approval of the minutes from the last semi-annual meeting. Approved unanimously.

Joanne Berentson moved and Kris Merritt seconded approval of the annual reports as printed. Approved unanimously.

Pastor's Report

Pastor John stressed that visitation will be a focus item for him this year, and thanked Jane Fraser who has offered to assist scheduling this for him. He then shared a video presentation from the Dancraig School in Tanzania, showing the construction progress on the dormitory they are building.

Intern Report

Pastor Lori continues to focus on the youth of the church and her project to train lay members on serving communion to the homebound. She will be performing all pastoral duties from June through August.

Property and Management Committee Report

Brad Wyman presented for the committee. The committee considers re-siding and replacing the windows in the parish house to be the next top priority and has received a bid for \$60,000. The congregation was asked to authorize spending up to \$64,000 for this project, since there could be unknown additional work. Patsy Martin moved, and Bud Bowers seconded this be approved. Approved unanimously.

Additional discussion topics for the committee were repair and replacement of the septic system and the likely demolishment of the Scout Building, which is in poor condition.

Finance and Stewardship Committee Report

Jerry Sells discussed the Time and Talent Survey for the Stewardship portion of the committee. It will be sent out again in an improved format to better capture congregational interests.

Steven Dahl presented the 2023 spending plan and discussed the major changes for the year. The major increases were in personnel costs and benevolences. Larry Olsen brought up several points on the \$500 benevolences planned for several campus ministry programs. He recommended making a change from one school to another, initiating a significant discussion amongst the congregation. This was resolved when Kristen Caldwell moved to accept the spend plan as published. This was seconded by Cheryl Conner and approved unanimously by the congregation. Carrie Omdal made a motion to not send money to any colleges that was not approved.

Nominating Committee Report

RuthAnne moved to include Jerry Sells, Karen Fisher, Jane Fraser, Linda Johnson, Judy Sheahan, and Sara Dahl for the nominating committee. Joanne Berentson seconded the names for the nominating committee. Jerry Sells nominated Keith and Christie Peterson to represent the church to the Josephine Caring Community. Judy seconded the Josephine nominees. Bonnie Bowers nominated David Benson and Peter Blau-Ormsby to represent the church to Lutherwood with Chris Omdal as an alternate for Lutherwood. Patsy Martin seconded the Lutherwood nominees.

All nominees were approved unanimously.

At 1:10 Tom Sheahan moved to adjourn; AnnaLaurie Wattson Lamb seconded. Approved unanimously.

Edison Lutheran Church Semi-Annual Meeting Minutes 25 June 2023

Call to Order: Council President Linda Johnson called the meeting to order at 11:50 a.m.

Pastor John led the congregation in an opening prayer.

Roll was taken via sign-in sheet.

Approval of the minutes of the January 2023 Annual Meeting. Christie Peterson moved, Joann Berentson seconded and the minutes were approved unanimously.

Button Peterson Committee Report Kris Merritt

The committee has decided to use half of the generous donation, \$50,000 to build a larger play area behind the church. That half of the funds will pay for equipment and the installation. The remainder of the funds, \$50,000 will provide benches and a small shelter for folks to watch their children. She reminded the congregation that this money was a gift and not part of the annual budget. They hope to have the first phase of the project completed by winter. They plan to work closely with the Property and Management committee in relation to the new septic plan for the church and parish house.

Fall Church Dinner Linda Johnson

There will be a fall church dinner on October 19 sponsored by church council. It will be a fund raiser with the money donated to pay for the tear down of the Scout building and work on the outdoor space. It has yet to be determined if it will be salmon or meatloaf.

Financial/Giving Update Steven Dahl

The council planned an aggressive budget process for 2023-2024. They estimated a 5% increase in giving, but were expecting a shortfall. The additional giving didn't happen but council has approved spending from various sources where money is available. The church has seen a 5% increase in giving recently.

A few budget items are over on spending. March and May benevolence payments were substantial, the majority being paid then.

Nominating Committee Report Linda Johnson

Candidates for Council were nominated for three year terms. They are; Patsy Martin, Laura Engebretsen, AnnaLaurie Wattson Lamb and Linda Tyler. Judy Sheahan moved, Luanne Knutzen seconded and the motion carried unanimously to accept this slate of candidates for council.

Property and Management Committee Report Keith Peterson

The septic system for the church was put in when his grandfather was a member. The system has failed and they have a temporary patch in place but the whole system needs replacing. The idea is to also tie in the parish house for when that system fails, which will be soon. This will require use of the building fund and donations to facilitate the replacement of the septic system. Mike Miller moved, Inger Conner seconded to approve this project and it was approved unanimously.

Goals (areas of focus) for church for next three years (2023-2025) Pastor John

Pastor John reviewed for the congregation the process that the council used to determine the goals to be worked toward in the next three years. The council did this three years ago in order to complete the master plan for the call process, and thought it a good idea to continue to look forward at where we are headed as a congregation. The council picked six areas of focus. And the council will drill down on those goals at their August meeting. The broad range goals are:

Provide more social opportunities for our youth and families
Increase knowledge and fluency in reading the bible among congregation members
Maintain, support and grow youth group through regular meetings and social outings
Continue and expand support for local and global community organizations
Continue to hold worship in high regard, supporting our Worship and Music Committee
Involve many different people of all ages in all the roles of worship, including holding one to two
youth Sunday services per year.

2022-2023 Intern Report Pastor Lori

Pastor Lori reported that the youth group has grown from six to 16 members, outgrowing the Parish house as a place to meet. Jenny Sheahan and Darla Jensen will be the group leaders when her internship is over the end of August. The group has gone to Holden, had deep bible studies, bonded very well and prepared and executed a youth Sunday that is still being talked about as a wonderful experience for all. They also volunteered to work at whatever was needed at the Shrove Tuesday dinner last February. They are bringing friends, engaging each other and making dinner together. Hopefully this will continue to be a priority at Edison. Help them grow in their faith. Her last Sunday is August 27 which will be another youth Sunday. She thanked everyone for being so welcoming to her husband and Tater.

Service Member List Linda Johnson

When cleaning out the Scout building, a poster with names of service members from Edison was found. It is in good shape and should be updated and hung in the fellowship hall. If you know of members who should be on the poster, please let Linda know.

Project Information sheets were distributed, and sign-in sheets circulated for attendance.

Pastor Linda Larson leads us in prayer.

Linda J introduces Keith Peterson and Brad Wyman to explain the situation, and Steven Dahl to answer any financial questions.

Thank you to the congregation for already supporting two major projects that were completed this year: sewer system and Parish House re-siding.

Keith explained that the current heating system has failed, and the Sunday School downstairs area will now require a ductless system.

The bid received from Foss Heating is \$37,621. This repair is necessary, not optional.

Question from the congregation: Did we only receive one bid? Yes, we only received the one bid from Foss Heating; the last work done was from the lowest bid and led to these problems. Foss is a reputable company and does all the work on our current system, so it makes sense to stay with them. Very happy with their work and service.

Joanne Berentson moved to approve the purchase of the heat pump system as described.

Jon Aarstad seconded the motion.

The motion was approved by the congregation unanimously.

Linda J thanked the Property & Management committee for their hard work.

Linda J asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting; Kris Merritt made a motion to adjourn.

Altar Guild meets the first Wednesday of each month at 10:00am, in the Parish House. We do not meet in June or July. The Altar Guild is responsible for care of worship linens, paraments, as well as preparation for communion, funerals, baptisms, confirmations and weddings at Edison Lutheran Church. Members also bake bread served at communion. Altar Guild members prepare the sanctuary for all seasons of the church year: Pentecost, All Saints Sunday, Harvest Sunday, Lent, Easter, Advent, and Christmas. For our Sunday services, members prepare the altar for communion, and assist with serving communion as needed.

Communion is usually served at the communion rail for those who wish to come forward. If you are baptized you are invited to receive communion or receive a blessing at the rail. All are welcome. Communion is served from one of two pouring chalices into individual cups brought to the rail by the congregation, along with the homemade bread. Wine is offered from the blue pouring chalice and grape juice from the white pouring chalice. There is also a gluten free option as needed. If you wish to receive communion at your seat, there are pre-packaged elements, you can pick up from the greeters or ushers as you enter, and Pastor will direct you when it's time.

Altar Guild and the Worship and Music Committee work together for Shrove Tuesday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services held at Edison Lutheran. On Palm Sunday, palms are distributed in the Fellowship Hall for the congregation to parade into the sanctuary carrying their palms and laying them at the front of the altar. On Easter Sunday, worship begins with the children carrying vases of tulips to the altar at the beginning of the service where they are placed on or near the rail, in celebration of the resurrection.

We encourage not only women, but also men and youth, especially confirmation students to consider joining this committee. It is most rewarding.

Edison Lutheran Church Christian Education Committee 2023 Annual Report

This committee is responsible for providing Christian Education for all ages. Although, adult and youth Christian education has been increasing, the committee is not active. We are working to make this an active committee in 2024.

Our Sunday School program is going very well. The teachers for the 2022-2023 school year were: Janet Wyman, Mandy Englund, Brenda Geary, Ashlynn Coward, and Rebecca Geary. Pastor John, Intern Pastor Lori, and Carrie Omdal taught the confirmation class for the 2022-2023 school year. For the 2023-2024 school year, the Sunday School teachers are: Brenda and Becca Geary team teaching the pre-school children; Janet Wyman and Stephanie Knutzen team teaching grades 1-3; and Sarah Dahl and Kali Howard team teaching grades 4-6. There were an average of 20 Sunday School students weekly. Peter Blau Ormsby and David Benson began each Sunday with music and prayer with the whole group and then the students went to their grade appropriate classes. The Confirmation class changes dramatically in the Fall of 2023. The class has four 7th graders. Pastor John, the students, and their parents have class using the curriculum, *Free to Be* by Gerhard Forde and Jim Nestingen.

Service projects are a key developmental activity in Youth Christian development. The Sunday School has been involved with a coat drive and worked with the Confirmation students to organize, advertise, and run a food drive, and deliver a full van of food to Helping Hands Food Bank. The Confirmation students were involved in several activities in 2023. They served as acolytes for worship. They made dozens of cookies and bagged them for Family Promise and Friendship House. They maintained a food pantry in a shelf outside the church where people can help themselves to the food and cleaning items.

Our adult Christian education includes Bible studies and our new Bible Experience Class. We continue to have weekly bible study with Pastor John via Zoom each week and Women's Bible Study led by Linda Larson on the 3rd Wednesday of every month in the Fellowship Hall. In addition, this Fall Pastor John is having a Bible Experience Class on Sunday mornings, which has been attended by 25-30 people each week. The Property and Management Committee meets on the first Tuesday of the month as needed. The committee is responsible for general maintenance, maintaining and improving church property and planning upgrades to the property. There are always regular maintenance items to be accomplished. Lawn and flower bed care along with trimming and pruning are aways on the top of that list.

We also plan and undertake many other projects. Examples of this year's list are the following:

- Outdoor lights were cleaned, replaced and in some cases painted.
- The septic tank inspection was completed and passed.
- The county fire and safety inspections were completed and passed.
- We helped with the design of the new playground, and we will help with the groundwork for the area.
- The old library was transformed into a prayer shawl room for the church.
- The ELCW's storage room was remodeled with new shelves into a more efficient area.
- The committee led an inside and outside spring clean-up day.
- An inspection of the sewer pipes to the septic tank was completed to determine the reason for the sewer plugging.
- The outside surface of the Narthex doors were cleaned, primed, and painted for better weather protection.
- An additional freezer was purchased for more storage.

We had some very large projects completed this year. It started with the decision to replace an old and outdated septic and sewer system. This project entailed putting in a new system for the church and Parish House. The approved project cost approximately \$27,000.

Edison Lutheran delegates, Keith and Christie Peterson have attended quarterly Josephine Caring Community (JCC) delegate meetings. All meetings this year were in person at JCC in the church. It was recently reported that they are slowly coming back from the damage caused by COVID. There are positive signs everywhere that this is happening.

JCC is still very much involved in the development and building of <u>Josephine Smokey Point Independent Living (Cascade Village)</u>, and the <u>Stanwood Independent Living Apartments</u>. These communities are slated to open late in 2024. They are currently involved in a sales drive. As of September, there have been 16 depositors for Cascade Village with a goal of 30 this year. The Stanwood Independent Living units will have presentable plans by the end of the year.

Josephine at Home is a two-pronged branch of JCC. The Home Care branch provides hourly caregivers to assist in the home. This program is building with their loss down considerably from previous months. They are actively involved in building their caseloads.

The Suites Senior Living have had their best financial performance ever. The suites are private apartments with assisted living and individualized amenities.

There are opportunities to become Board members at JCC. If you are interested in a chance to serve in this capacity, please contact them.

JCC provides a Speaker's Bureau. Current and recent JCC board members are now available to speak at churches and civic organizations about what JCC has to offer to residents and employees.

Edison Lutheran's Parish Life Committee encompasses a variety of groups within our congregation, each one working to live out our mission to welcome, nurture and serve. The Parish Life Committee is a group of enthusiastic members who organize and support events which enhance the life of the congregation through recognition and celebration. Activities often center around food. A recurring responsibility for a member of the committee is assigning coffee hour fellowship hosts who serve the congregation following nearly all Sunday morning services. This provides members and guests an opportunity to connect and share important life events.

In April, the committee hosted an amazing Easter Brunch with over 90 people attending. Then in August, we hosted the farewell brunch for Intern Pastor Lori Cavender. The plated meal was prepared by our committee and served by our youth. Early in November, Parish Life members and others, gathered to prepare a celebration dinner, honoring the ordination and installation of our very own Intern Pastor Lori. The meal was served at Salem Lutheran, with 100+ in attendance.

On November 19th, the Parish Life Committee organized the Harvest Potluck and Pie Auction, realizing \$3,518.00 toward the costs of renovating the parish house. Three weeks later, on Following the Sunday School Christmas Program on December 10th, Parish Life members served a Christmas Brunch to over 100 people, many of whom stayed and visited until early afternoon.

Affiliated with this committee are the Prayer Shawl Group and Care Team Members, each with their specific areas of service to the congregation and community as we reach out to serve others. Parish Life meetings are typically held following the Sunday morning service during coffee hour, ideally on a monthly basis. Discussion centers around upcoming events and responsibilities for specific aspects of the event are taken on by committee members. We also review and discuss the previous event and suggest changes that might make it more successful in the future.

Our committee looks forward to 2024 and continuing many of the events from past years, while being open to try new ideas that will help welcome, nurture, and serve our congregation and community.

Edison Lutheran Church Social Concerns Ministry Committee 2023 Annual Report

The Social Concerns Committee has continued to meet on the first Monday of the month to plan and facilitate ministries beyond the walls of the church. New committee members or drop in visits to our committee are welcome. Here is a summary of what we did in 2023.

We have purchased, prepared, and served food for 100-120 people at Friendship House and the Burlington First Step village on the last Monday of every month of the year.

We hosted residents of the Family Promise shelter for 3-4 day stretches on a quarterly basis. The host site changed this fall from being at Burlington Lutheran Church to being at Bethlehem Lutheran in Sedro Woolley.

This year the church council, with our committee input, made the decision to change our support from the Alger Food Bank to Helping Hands Food Bank where our donations can have a greater impact. The grocery cart in the narthex is the collection point for nonperishable food and household goods that are taken to Helping Hands.

We facilitated the use of ELC as a blood draw site for Bloodworks Northwest every other month this year. They report that at our site they registered 343 donors, collected 314 units of blood, and signed up 16 first time donors in 2023 because we opened our doors to this life saving work.

We did a special project this year in helping to furnish Martha's Place, a new 70 unit apartment building to enable people to move from homelessness into stable housing. We fully furnished 10 bathrooms, provided 25 brooms and dustpans, and donated other items such as mugs, pillows, sheets, and kitchen dish racks. The building, run by Catholic Community Services, opened to residents in May.

ELC members filled 96 drawstring back packs with school supplies to create School Kits for Lutheran World Relief (LWR). Our committee prepared the bags, organized a packing event, and saw that the boxed up Kits made it to the LWR Ingathering in Seattle.

We collected fabric and sewing notions by the tub full for the Farmworkers Support Center sewing group. They were thrilled by this and have started sending us photos of their hard work.

We were once again amazed at the generosity of ELC as we made the appeal for gift cards for Family Promise Shelter residents and recent graduates to be able to Christmas shop for their children. 42 of these \$25 gift cards were donated as part of our "Early Angel" Advent project.

The Advent Giving Tree produced a massive box overflowing with staple items for the Family Promise shelter. Several carloads of items needed to meet the day to day needs of the residents were delivered to the Family Promise site at Bethlehem Lutheran.

The Social Concerns Committee coordinated Thrivent member use of their Action Team benefit. Eight Thrivent members each procured two \$250 grants to support our Friendship House meals, the Martha's Place project, to buy the School Kit bags, and to augment our Advent giving to Family Promise. We also work to remind Thrivent members of their benefit of directing Choice Dollars to not for profits such as ELC. If you are a Thrivent member and not accessing these benefits please contact any one of our committee members for assistance in being a part of ELC's ministry in this way.

The committee is well aware that it takes all of ELC to be a part of every one of these ministries, from driving School Kits to Seattle, delivering goods to Helping Hands, taking down and setting up for blood drives, serving shelter meals, spending nights at Family Promise, baking cookies (and parting with Halloween candy) for Friendship House, shopping for special projects, giving blood, all the way to the generous donations whenever a need is presented. We are blessed to have such a generous congregation.

There are many places to volunteer in the social concerns of ELC without committing to monthly meetings. Please contact any of the committee members listed if you would like to get involved in any of these ministries.

Stewardship Sub-Committee:

The Stewardship Sub-Committee is currently combined with the Finance Sub-Committee. It has been recommended the sub-committees be separated as they serve different functions. The Stewardship Sub-Committee generally works on communicating the church's need for Time, Talent and Treasure and the ways members can participate. The Finance Sub-Committee generally works on analyzing and communicating the church's financial condition. The separation will be presented to the congregation as a bylaws change (two separate bylaws) at the Congregational Meeting in January 2024.

In 2023, the Stewardship Committee provided an online option for the Time & Talents Survey for the first time. We used a Google Form and it worked very well. We received 88 responses, the highest response rate in years. The Stewardship Committee meets on an ad-hoc basis and typically via Zoom.

We have streamlined bill paying and used online banking to ensure bills are paid on-time. We have a 100% on-time rate for paying bills this year, which means no penalties or unnecessary interest. Finally, we have gone through the budget with a fine toothed comb to ensure we have an accurate budget to work with in 2024. This coming year we will be working on an audit of the financials. There will be a Committee on Stewardship, composed of at least three (3) members one of whom shall be a member of the Church Council. The Committee on Stewardship shall:

- b. Conduct regular meetings at such time and place as the committee may determine.
- c. Submit committee meeting updates to the church council via the stewardship committee council member.
- d. Prepare and submit a summarized report of the annual committee activities to be included in the church annual report for the annual meeting.
- e. Develop an annual committee budget and submit to the church council for consideration.
- f. Encourage liberal, thankful, loving and worshipful giving on the part of church members.
- g. Study stewardship literature and use God focused means to promote a strong stewardship consciousness.
- h. Keep time and talent forms of individual church members in order to enlist as many people as possible in the work of the church.
- i. Sponsor stewardship talks, discussions and forums.
- j. Inform the congregation of the stewardship challenges of the synod, national and international church body.
- k. Plan and execute programs in which the church members systematically, regularly and adequately cover both the church's financial needs and enlarge the proportional giving beyond the congregation.
- I. Serve as the church's link to the synod, national and international committees on stewardship.

Finance Committee

There will be a Committee on Finance, composed of at least three (3) members one of whom shall be a member of the Church Council. The Committee on Finance shall:

- a. Elect from its own membership a chairperson and secretary.
- b. Conduct regular meetings at such time and place as the committee may determine.
- c. Submit committee meeting updates to the church council via the finance committee council member.
- d. Prepare and submit a summarized report of the annual committee activities to be included in the church annual report for the annual meeting.
- e. Develop an annual committee budget and submit to the church council for consideration.
- f. Develop a strong and achievable church budget and present to church council for their review, consideration and recommendation to the congregation. Amend the budget as directed by council. Present the budget to the congregation at the annual church meeting.
- g. Study prudent financial practices and tools and recommend their use by the church secretary, finance committee and council.
- h. Regularly review and evaluate the church's financial health and report the condition to council.
- Schedule two people to count offerings each week at a time convenient to both parties.
 Council member of the day and one other person are responsible for securing the offering in the safe after worship services.
- j. Inform the congregation of the financial challenges of the synod, national and international church body.
- k. Serve as the church's link to the synod, national and international committees on finance.

The Worship and Music Committee meets the first Wednesday of each month in the fellowship hall. The committee assists in planning the Sunday as well as the Advent and Lenten mid-week worship services, works with Altar guild to plan the Shrove Tuesday event and assists Council as requested.

The pre-Lent Shrove Tuesday Pancake Feed was a huge success, with the Young Adult group serving and cleaning up afterwards. The Mudflat Ramblers Dixieland Band played for about two hours and was great entertainment. Thank you Peter!

This service is for people for whom Christmas is not a fun time, and who would like to meditate and find rest in simple music. There are also stations to visit to make an effort to do something positive at that time. There were about 40 in attendance.

Christmas Eve this year fell on a Sunday, so there were three services that day; one in the morning at 10:30, and the usual Christmas Eve services at 5 pm and 9 pm. They were all well attended, with the 5 pm having the most attendees. The music was all done vocally, and with the churches instruments, no extra instrument musicians were utilized this year.
